A LIFETIME OF INDEPENDENCE

Jason Regier begins his next chapter with Cozumel.

For Jason Regier, returning to KSDS felt a little like coming home.

Nearly three decades have passed since he first arrived on campus in 1998, just two years after a life-changing spinal cord injury. At the time, he was learning what life with a disability would look like and searching for a way to reclaim his independence.

Jason found that opportunity in a yellow labrador named Newley.

"Newley was my bridge to independence," he said.

That partnership changed everything.

Newley helped Jason remain in a manual wheelchair, retrieving dropped items, pulling him through difficult terrain, and making everyday tasks possible. More importantly, the assistance dog gave him the confidence to rediscover the life he thought he had lost.

With Newley by his side, Jason returned to work, traveled independently, competed in wheelchair sports, and eventually represented the United States at the Paralympic Games.

"It was one of those things where you're dependent on somebody for everything," Jason recalled. "Then suddenly you begin realizing what's possible."

Today, Jason reflects on those years as the beginning of a journey that continues to unfold.

Following Newley came Flurry, his second KSDS assistance dog.



Together they navigate another chapter of life, including marriage, raising children, and the countless moments that make up everyday living.

Now, Jason is writing his third chapter alongside Cozumel.

Although this wasn't his first trip back to KSDS, he still felt nervous.

"You know what's coming," he said. "You know Washington. You know the staff. But you don't know your dog."

That uncertainty didn't last long.

Jason has known KSDS Service Dog Trainer, Annette Kohlmeyer, for many years and trusted her completely.

"I told her, 'Get the right dog. You know me. You know my personality. You know what stage of life I'm in. I'm willing to wait.'"

When Annette met Cozumel, she knew she had found the perfect match.

Only a few days into team training, Jason already felt as though Cozumel had been part of his life for months.

"He's a gentle giant," Jason said with a smile. "You go out on outings, and it just feels comfortable. It feels natural." That confidence doesn't happen by accident.

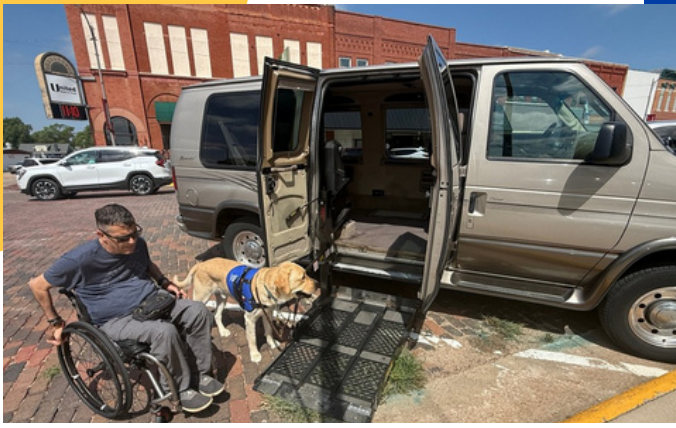


Jason credits the experience and dedication of the KSDS training staff for creating partnerships that seem almost effortless.

"The trainers have a gift," he said. "They know the dogs. They know the clients. It's almost magic how they can match them."

Having experienced three KSDS partnerships over nearly 30 years, Jason has witnessed firsthand the care and expertise behind every match.

"It's amazing to watch," he said. "They don't just train dogs. They understand personalities. They see potential and know exactly where each dog belongs."

While many people notice an assistance dog retrieving an item or opening a door, Jason says the most meaningful moments often happen where no one else is watching.

"Eighty or ninety percent of what the dog does, people will never see," he explained.

"It's at home. It's in your van when you drop your keys. It's when you're tired. It's those little moments that make all the difference."

Those moments have helped Jason stay active, to pursue his career, raise a family, travel, compete, and continue living the life he envisioned after his injury.

His assistance dogs have become more than working partners.

"They're family," Jason said simply.

As he begins this newest chapter with Cozumel, Jason hopes supporters understand the incredible impact they make possible through KSDS.

"You are allowing an organization to change lives," he said.

"What more could you want than that?" For Jason, KSDS has never been just a place where he received an assistance dog. It is a community that has walked beside him for nearly thirty years. Now, with Cozumel at his side, the journey continues.

● **Public Etiquette Matters:** The team highlighted crucial guidelines for interacting with working dogs in public, reminding attendees to avoid distracting a working dog in harness to ensure their partner's safety.

● **Making a Community Impact:** The session emphasized how KSDS pairs dogs with handlers at no cost, relying on community support, volunteers, and donors to sustain their mission.
